## Tribal Caucus: Concept & Practice

## Purpose

- To be **respectful** of all participant's time in the consultation process
- To ensure that messages delivered on the record are **representative** of the whole
- To ensure that all tribal representatives participating in an advisory committee help educate one another on issues that may be of importance and provide more background for others who may not be as familiar with a given issue
- To make sure that the agenda serves the intended purpose of the meeting and accurately reflects what people wish to discuss
- Rationale
  - Members have few opportunities to meet in-person each year, which is critical to a cultural process and allows us to merge issues and concerns across regions
    - E.g., Agency representatives would not speak on behalf of their agencies without first consulting with supervisors and others within their agency to ensure accuracy and representativeness of statements
  - Process is a long-held practice in tribal consultation groups with the Administration (WHTNC) and other agencies, like IHS; it is the equivalent of Standard Operating Procedure
  - Separate spaces can be essential for collaborative processes
- Respect for ALL Participants
  - We need to be considerate of space so that all participants and agency partners have an adequate location to retire to while the caucus is being held that is respectful of their time and work needs
- Consideration of Timing
  - To be respectful of others in the room schedule caucus opportunities into the agenda (like today)
  - Place at a time on the agenda such that any new knowledge or information or items for discussion from the
    presentations has been provided and can be considered and/or prior to talking to key heads of state (e.g., Dr. Collins).
